<p><u>Online Etymology Dictionary</u></p> <p>Comprehensive resource for tracing the origins of English words. Provides detailed etymological information, including root words and historical usage.</p>

Etymological Analysis Techniques

Sound Correspondences

<p><b>Definition:</b> Systematic relationships between sounds in related languages that indicate common ancestry.</p>
<p><b>Example:</b> Grimm's Law, which describes sound shifts in Germanic languages compared to Proto-Indo-European.</p>
<p><b>Application:</b> Identifying cognates (words with a common origin) by observing regular sound changes.</p>

Semantic Change

<p><b>Definition:</b> The evolution of a word's meaning over time.</p>
<p><b>Types:</b> Broadening, narrowing, amelioration, pejoration, metaphor, metonymy.</p>
<p><b>Example:</b> 'Nice' originally meant 'foolish' but now means 'pleasant'.</p>

Reconstruction

<p><b>Definition:</b> The process of inferring the form of an ancestral word or language based on its descendants.</p>
<p><b>Method:</b> Comparing cognates in related languages and applying sound correspondences to reconstruct the proto-form.</p>
