	Smiling Face with Smiling Eyes: Indicates happiness, gratitude, or politeness.		
	Thumbs Up: Signifies approval, agreement, or a job well done.		
	Thinking Face: Used to express contemplation, skepticism, or confusion.		
	Fire: Indicates something is hot, trendy, or amazing.		
	Hundred Points Symbol: Represents perfection, excellence, or strong agreement.		

IFolded Hands: Can mean prayer, gratitude, or asking for forgiveness.

## Emojis in Different Contexts

Combine emojis to express more complex ideas or narratives. For example:	Professional Communication	Use emojis sparingly. Opt for universally understood symbols like I or I. Avoid overly expressive or ambiguous emojis.	Many human emojis support skin tone modifiers based on the Fitzpatrick scale. To use a modifier, add one of the following after the emoji: Light Skin Tone Medium-Light Skin Tone Medium Skin Tone Medium-Dark Skin Tone Dark Skin Tone Example: 00,00
	Casual Communication	Feel free to use a wider range of emojis to express emotions and add personality. Be mindful of your audience and the overall tone.	
	Cultural Differences	Be aware that some emojis may have different meanings in different cultures. Research unfamiliar emojis before using them to avoid

## **Emoji Best Practices**

#### Context and Clarity

Most operating systems and devices have built-in emoji keyboards. Access them using the following methods:

- Windows: Press Win + . or Win + ;

- Unicode Lookup: Find Unicode information about any emoji.
- Emoji Picker Chrome Extension: quickly select emojis from the browser.

## Accessibility

Keep in mind that screen readers will often announce emojis by their description (e.g., 'face with tears of joy'). Avoid using emojis in a way that disrupts the flow of the text or makes it difficult for users with disabilities to understand the message. Limit excessive emoji use.

#### Consistency

Be consistent in your emoji usage to maintain a clear and coherent tone. If you use a particular emoji to represent a specific idea or emotion, stick with that association throughout your communication. This helps prevent misunderstandings and reinforces your intended message.
